

**RE: SB 470 (Jones) – SUPPORT**

Dear Senator Stern:

Our organizations, which represent hundreds of thousands of wildlife conservationists and outdoor enthusiasts in California, urge you to support SB 470 (Jones), which would create an annual combination hunting and fishing license.

California hunting and fishing license sales, which totaled \$84 million in 2020, have declined for decades, despite the recent uptick in revenues during the COVID pandemic. This decline not only contributes to the structural revenue imbalance faced by the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW), but has negative consequences for wildlife habitat, enforcement and other conservation activities that are funded through licenses. Other hunting and fishing-related revenue, such as the sale of required stamps, tags and validations (\$26 million) and Federal Aid in Wildlife Restoration Act and Federal Aid in Sport Fish Restoration Act excise taxes on hunting and fishing equipment (\$27 million), also provide important monies for wildlife conservation work in California on an annual basis.

In addition, hunting and fishing activities in California support tens of thousands of jobs and significant economic activity, especially in rural areas.

One factor that has likely contributed to the downward license trend is a dearth of consumer choice in the types of licenses that CDFW offers. As compared with other states, California offers relatively few types of hunting and fishing licenses and only a handful of changes have been made to our licensing system in the last 20 years. Many sportsmen and women believe more needs to be done update the license system, and a number of changes, including the adoption of a combination hunting and fishing license, were recently supported by stakeholder groups during DFW's hunting and fishing recruitment, retention and reactivation (R3) public input process.

About 40 other states have combination hunting and fishing licenses, including neighboring Oregon, Nevada and Arizona. No state that we are aware of that has adopted a combination license has ceased to offer it, whether because of lack of interest, declining sales or any other reason.

SB 470 would not only create a combination hunting and fishing license, it would allow the license to be valid from 365 days from the date specified on the license—a change which a number of other states have also already adopted. This would facilitate the ability of license buyers to most efficiently and effectively utilize the license. In addition, the bill would allow purchasers who agree to automatically renew their license each year to receive a 5% discount. This option is currently available for fishing license buyers in California, but not for hunting licenses.

Please also note that SB 470 would not take effect until 2023, which would allow DFW sufficient time to implement its provisions.

Our current hunting and fishing license system is largely outdated and in need of modifications, especially innovative changes like combination licenses which have proven themselves in other states. Please support SB 470 when it is considered by your committee.
